
ZEN motes



Rohatsuis an abbreviation of the words Rogetsu (the last month of the year) and hatsu (eight days). It refers to the first week of December ending with December Eighth, when the Buddha's Enlightenment is celebrated in Japan. The monks in their monasteries undertake such severe practice during this time that it is referred to as inochi tori (life-taking) rõhatsu. For one week they struggle, with all their strength, the hardier not sleeping at all, to repeat the Buddha's effort to reach the Great Awakening he attained when, sitting under the Bodhi Tree, he saw the morning star.

Mrs. Vanessa Coward, a lay Zen student privileged to take some part in Röhatsu at Daitoku-ji in Kyoto, here records her impressions. Those who have experienced the event can best appreciate her success in conveying its atmosphere, but we believe others, too, will be enabled to catch glimpses of this subtle world if they will use their Zen Eye.


